B. Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes

1. Course Description

The overall objective of the course is to teach the basic reading skills in English and to provide foundation for effective and critical reading. The course provides students with a large amount of EFL vocabulary and lays particular emphasis on reading strategies in an attempt to make students avoid the word-by-word reading technique. It introduces reading-related skills, such as vocabulary, grammar and comprehension strategies. It also trains students on making inferences and summarizing the general ideas included in the reading comprehensions.

2. Course Main Objective

The main objective of this course is to introduce students to effective reading and equip them with (co-)requisite reading strategies to enhance their reading skills, broaden their knowledge of vocabulary, train them on making inferences and predictions and enable them to make use of contextual clues to infer meanings of unfamiliar words.
